2. Barriers to future attainment (for pupils eligible for PP including high ability)	
In-school barriers	
A.	School closures due to Covid have greatly affected pupils living in deprivation. The Autumn data shows a significant shortfall for PP children in Year 1 in Reading and phonics and Year 2 and 4 across all core subjects. This area will require careful monitoring, target setting and use of the catch-up funding as well as PP funding to support children in bridging the gap between them and others. QE governors to monitor.
B.	Children from a background of deprivation not having high personal aspirations and the life skills needed to succeed.
External barriers	
C.	Less parental engagement from a small groups of PP children and families.
D.	PA absence of Pupil Premium children is still a concern. Children from disadvantaged backgrounds have attended less online learning, do not have the ICT equipment to access learning and less parental support.
